
THE DOWNSTAIRS GIRL BY STACY LEE

In his daring first novel, R. Zamora Linmark treats the music of the Bee Gees and schoolyard bullying as equally formative experiences in the lives of a group of Filipino fourth-graders living in Kalihi, Honolulu, who call themselves the "Farrah Fawcett Fan Club." The characters' stories unfold largely in the documentary detritus of their lives—their poems and prayers, book reports and teacher evaluations—all written in carefully observed, pitch-perfect vernacular.

JAPANESE AMERICAN INCARCERATION

The Chinatown/International District was undeniably altered by the effects of Japanese American incarceration during World War II. From the displacement of the vibrant and sizable Japanese American community to the loss of historic spaces and businesses within Nihonmachi, or Japantown, Japanese American incarceration left our neighborhood forever changed. The books below are a small fraction of the resources that can help prepare your students to walk through our historic Japantown and develop nuanced and thoughtful conversations about Japanese American history.

WE ARE NOT FREE BY TRACI CHEE

Fourteen teens who have grown up together in Japantown, San Francisco. Fourteen teens who form a community and a family, as interconnected as they are conflicted.

Fourteen teens whose lives are turned upside down when over 100,000 people of Japanese ancestry are removed from their homes and forced into desolate incarceration camps. In a world that seems determined to hate them, these young Nisei must rally together as racism and injustice threaten to pull them apart.

WE HEREBY REFUSE BY FRANK ABE, TAMIKO NIMURA, ROSS ISHIKAWA, MATT SASAKI

Three voices. Three acts of defiance. One mass injustice. The story of camp as you've never seen it before. Japanese Americans complied when evicted from their homes in World War II -- but many refused to submit to imprisonment in American concentration camps without a fight. In this groundbreaking graphic novel, meet JIM AKUTSU, the inspiration for John Okada's No-No Boy, who refuses to be drafted from the camp at Minidoka when classified as a non-citizen, an enemy alien; HIROSHI KASHIWAGI, who resists government pressure to sign a loyalty oath at Tule Lake, but yields to family pressure to renounce his U.S. citizenship; and MITSUYE ENDO, a reluctant recruit to a lawsuit contesting her imprisonment, who refuses a chance to leave the camp at Topaz so that her case could reach the U.S. Supreme Court. DISPLACEMENT BY KIKU HUGHES

Kiku is on vacation in San Francisco when suddenly she finds herself displaced to the 1940s Japanese-American internment camp that her late grandmother, Ernestina, was forcibly relocated to during World War II. These displacements keep occurring until Kiku finds herself "stuck" back in time. Living alongside her young grandmother and other Japanese-American citizens in internment camps, Kiku gets the education she never received in history class. She witnesses the lives of Japanese-Americans who were denied their civil liberties and suffered greatly, but managed to cultivate community and commit acts of resistance in order to survive.

ADIOS TO TEARS: THE MEMOIRS OF A JAPANESE-PERUVIAN INTERNEE IN U.S. CONCENTRATION CAMPS BY SEIICHI HIGASHIDE

Adios to Tears is the very personal story of Seiichi Higashide (1909–97), whose life in three countries was shaped by a bizarre and little-known episode in the history of World War II. Born in Hokkaido, Higashide emigrated to Peru in 1931. By the late 1930s he was a community leader in the provincial town of Ica, but following the outbreak of World War II, he, along with other Latin American Japanese, was seized by police and forcibly deported to the United States. He was interned behind barbed wire at the Immigration and Naturalization Service facility in Crystal City, Texas, for more than two years. After his release, Higashide elected to stay in the U.S. and eventually became a citizen and a leading activist for redress for Peruvian Japanese communities incarcerated during the war.
